All about special educational needs

SEND describes the needs of a child who has a difficulty or disability which makes learning harder for them, than for other children of the same age. Around one in five children has SEND at some point during their school years. SEND covers a broad spectrum of difficulty or disability. Children may have wide-ranging or specific problems. These difficulties may occur in:

- Reading, writing, mathematics
- Interpreting social situations
- Sensory perception or physical mobility
- Managing their emotions and behaviour
- Making friends or relating to adults

These difficulties cause barriers to the child's learning. The school will assess your child to identify strengths, needs and the extra help they may require.

There are two main stages to the SEND Code of Practice:

SEN Support: Extra help in class, small group support, target interventions, support from outside agencies

Educational, Health and Care Plan: Needs are complex and much more severe.

What is offered to your child

The school offers the following, in addition to high quality teaching:

- A personalised, inclusive curriculum to match individual needs if required
- Termly targets set through a personalised Individual Education Plan (IEP) and meetings to review/discuss these with parents and child(ren)
- In-class support from additional adults and/or outside agencies
- Additional programmes in their area of need (literacy, maths, behavioural) delivered in either a small group or on a one-to-one basis
- Test and exam concessions
- Enhanced access to ICT or specialist equipment if required
